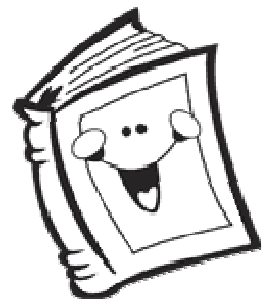

**MEET ELDER, DEACON, AND LONG TIME MEMBER,  
CLYDE ZERBEL ~ BY MIRIAM HILTON**

“I must have been about five when my mother took me to the old Presbyterian Church to hear Frank Denny sing.” Clyde remembers. “He was really good.”

Dad was manager of the Delft theater and when fire broke out in the Masonic building in the winter of 1938, we strapped on snow shoes and plowed down town in the middle of the street. The flames kept us moving. Spray from the fire hoses froze on the walls and trees. Fred Donckers opened his store and served coffee to the firefighters all night.”

Clyde joined the First Presbyterian Church of Marquette on April, 9, 1941 when Homer Mitchell was pastor and sang in the Junior choir with Miss Pohlman. He was part of the group that petitioned the Session to have a Christmas Eve service. “The Youth Group did the whole thing. Afterwards, we were so excited that we marched up the hill to the Hotel Northland and sang carols around the Christmas tree in the lobby for the guests. They really enjoyed it.”

He was in front of the church when a friend introduced him to Dorothy. “I thought she was very nice. She told me later that she knew from that minute that we’d be married. It was eight years later, when I finally had a good job with the LS and I Railroad that we were married in her parents’ living room. My high school friend, Dick Nelson who’d gone into the ministry from First Presbyterian, performed the ceremony. We were married for 57 years. Hospice was very good to her in the last years. I miss her terribly.”

At 17, Clyde began his career as a section hand on the railroad and worked his way up through cashier and clerk to weigh master in the West yard, where he was responsible for checking the weight of the ore and balancing the grades of ore before the cargo was loaded into the ships. “That was lots of fun.” Today, his son, Roger, loads the ore.

In 1944, he graduated from Graveraet, enlisted in the Air Force and served as NCO in charge of communication on planes flying from Shanghai, to Peking, Manila and Tokyo. After his discharge, he worked briefly as a sawyer, then for the LS and I for 40 years.

He was always active in the church. “I’ve done everything,” he says, “I was an usher when a church member supplied white carnations for our buttonholes. I was a Deacon for 12 years and an Elder for four when Bill Payne was pastor. Dorothy and I even taught the little ones in Sunday School for a short while.”

But his greatest delight was being Boy Scout leader to Troop #305. At one time, there were 36 boys in the troop, 4 patrols. They met weekly in the church and on weekends, went into the woods to sharpen their camping skills. “The boys really loved being outside, learning about trees, flowers and wildlife. They could all survive in the woods in any weather. Wayne Premeau was my first Eagle Scout and I had 12 after that. One of the hardest things I ever did for the Scouts was to give a presentation at Messiah Lutheran Church. I was very nervous. What if I, a Norwegian, made a mistake in front of 500 Swedes? But I did it.”

Now retired 25 years, he’s a member of the Legion and a Master Mason. He loves to hunt and fish on son Roger’s 80 acres. He’s proud of Roger and Natale’s son, Alex, a sophomore at MSHS and member of the varsity hockey team with Nick Cammarata. Son David graduated from NMU, married Patty and works for Lakes States Insulation in Howell. Their daughter, Hannah is in college. Son Scott married Nancy and their daughter, Jessica graduated from NMU and studied photography in England. Her sister, Samantha is studying education at CMU.

Grandson Alex, practices with the hockey team in the Lakeview Arena every afternoon, where Clyde, an avid hockey fan, can watch every day. He coached Marquette Junior Hockey for 13 years and was awarded Coach of the Year in 1975. “I can’t travel to away games any more, but this season the Redman will have 10 home games,” he announces with a smile.”

“In retirement, I’m humble and happy.” He has a saying “I learn every day.”

Clyde’s dream for First Presbyterian:

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ON OUR CHURCH AND MONEY**

**Questions and Answers on Our Church and Money**

**Q: How is our Stewardship Campaign Going?**

A: We're doing well. As of December 21<sup>th</sup>, we have received 97 pledges totaling \$190,736. The average amount pledged is \$1,966. Last year at this time we had received 104 pledges totaling \$184,042 with an average amount of \$1,770.

We are hoping to reach \$225,000, which is really what we need to fund all our church activities, so we still have a ways to go. The record was 2006, when we pledged \$220,681. Last year we ended at 109 pledges totaling \$194,000.

We encourage those who give regularly but do not pledge to consider pledging. It helps a great deal in budgeting and planning. The Church is able to use funds more effectively when we can predict our income. We recognize that sometimes situations change and that pledges may need to be changed, as well. One can always do that. We understand.

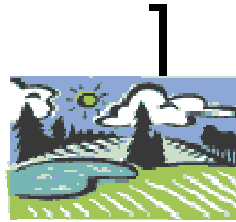
**FROM THE BOARD OF DEACONS - TOM MANSON**

## SIXTH IN A SERIES BY CHIP O'NEILL

## TENDING GOD'S GARDEN PART VI ~ CHIP O'NEILL

The other afternoon, while our black Lab and toy Poodle were taking us for our daily walk, I thought about the place of animals in God's garden. He must have regarded them as an important part of his creation. After all, He created all the creatures of the world three days before he even thought about man. When he gave us "dominion" over his creatures, surely He intended more than that we simply look on the animal world as something to be exploited for our own gain.

Watching our dogs, tails swinging happily as they dart here and there in the pursuit of scents and sounds we cannot detect, I realize how much we have learned from our four-legged companions. The world becomes an exciting place to investigate, offering something new each time we traverse the path. There is no time to be burdened with gloomy thoughts or worries – their wriggling behinds and wagging tails speak to joy and enthusiasm that is contagious. The eager response to our call when they stray too far off the trail speaks to devotion and loyalty. So much of what God would have us be is modeled before us every afternoon by our dogs. What a gift.

Now dogs get rather short shrift in Scripture perhaps because, in evolutionary terms, they are a rather late development. In their gradual adaptation to human coexistence, dogs have come to offer a myriad of services to their human companions. They serve in law enforcement, sniffing out contraband, explosives, and drugs. Their keen sense of smell has made them invaluable in finding victims of earthquakes and other disasters. Many nursing homes and even hospitals use dogs to relieve stress in patients and clients. Service dogs have long been used to assist the blind and are now in great demand helping veterans of Iraq and Afghanistan deal with their physical and emotional traumas. And as every dog owner can attest, there is no more faithful, loving, and forgiving friend than one's dog.

Unfortunately, we do not always reciprocate their devotion. At one end of the spectrum of abuse are the frightful stories of dog fights, staged for human amusement at a horrific cost to the dogs. At the other end is simple neglect, owners too busy or, in some cases financially unable to care properly for their dogs. Shouldn't God's Gardeners play a role in alleviating the suffering of those creatures over whose care we have been given divine dominion?

The Upper Peninsula Animal Welfare Shelter in Negaunee demonstrates what having dominion over God's creatures entails as it cares for hundreds of abused or neglected animals. While it primarily looks after, and tries to find adoptive homes for dogs and cats, one can find everything from mice, guinea pigs, rabbits, birds, even the occasional snake in its care. A few years ago it took on, at a great expense, the rescue and care of a number of horses found neglected in Ontonagon County.

There are many ways we can assist this wonderful organization in its mission:

- 1) We can see that our own dogs and cats are neutered or spayed – unwanted puppies and kittens can grow up to become feral predators which take an enormous toll on the wild bird population.
- 2) Become a volunteer at UPAWS.

If you want to learn more about this opportunity, speak with Chrystal Swanson who is a UPAWS volunteer.

- 3) Money and supplies are always needed. The UPAWS web site, [www.upaws.org](http://www.upaws.org), has a list of supplies it can always use.
- 4) You might consider adopting a dog or cat. There are younger dogs and kittens for the family looking to add some energy and life to its routine; there are also older dogs and cats, often surrendered because their owners can no longer afford to care for them. Adding a dog or cat to your life can open the world to you in new and exciting ways. And, while affirming that powerful scriptural statement, "God so loved the world that he gave us his only Son," I have to think that pets are yet another tangible example of that love.

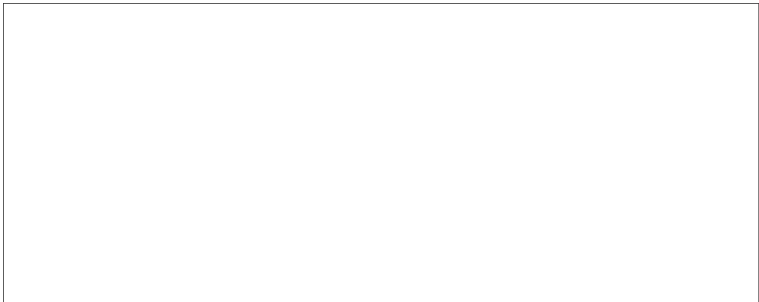
